

For the past 20 years, UCF has nurtured Flying Horse Editions, a collaborative research studio committed to creating significant works of art by leading and emerging artists who fuse traditional and innovative printmaking processes.


Artists come to Flying Horse Editions to work in the graphic media of intaglio, woodcut, lithography, letterpress, and silkscreen, and the results are highly collectible, limited-edition, handcrafted fine art prints and books. There are only a dozen or so fine art presses in the country, and Flying Horse Editions is one of the most distinguished on the East Coast.


On display at the Mennello Museum of Art in Orlando, IMPRINTS celebrates Flying Horse Editions with displays of prints, books, and objects.



Louis Roney to Join Florida Artists Hall of Fame



Former Professor of Music Louis Roney will be inducted into the Florida Artists Hall of Fame. He joins such legendary artists as Ray Charles, Ernest Hemingway, and Zora Neale Hurston.

An international concert star for more than 40 years, Louis Roney has sung the operatic literature in major opera houses around the world. As an early mentor of the Orlando arts community, he was founder and director of the popular Festival of Orchestras, bringing the world's orchestras to Orlando to perform with Florida's best concert musicians. His career has spanned many decades in the development of orchestral music performance in Florida. UCF honored him with their Distinguished Professor Faculty Award in 2000.

UCF alumna Laura Alexandra Ramos was awarded the "Best Actress" title at the annual Hollywood Reel Independent Film Festival last week. Ramos, who earned a bachelor's degree in Film - Cinema Studies from UCF in 2009, received the

award for her lead role in the comic drama *Nerve*. The film is about a young man who battles social anxiety and looks to Ramos's character, a psychology student, for help.

More than 50 films were shown at the festival, which aims to support and promote independent cinema in Los Angeles.

Ramos's next project is a biopic about baseball legend Roberto Clemente.

Two Theatre UCF actors have been honored by the National Kennedy Center/American College Theatre Festival for their performances in *Gem of the Ocean*. Kevia Goins, a junior in the BFA Acting program at UCF, was awarded "Distinguished Performance by an

Actress," while Associate Professor Be Boyd won "Distinguished Performance by a Faculty Guest Artist." *Gem of the Ocean* was directed by Professor Julia Listengarten.



Technology Preserves Vanishing Culture in China

Traditional Chinese art and culture are finding new life on the Internet thanks to a collaboration among UCF, the University of Oregon, and other partners in the U.S. and China.

The project, called ChinaVine, allows the group to share Chinese customs and folk culture using modern technology. For nearly six years, teams of students, professors, and other scholars have explored Chinese villages and captured descriptions and pictures of vanishing art forms for the project.

ChinaVine's educational reach will be further developed thanks to a \$25,000 National Endowment for the Arts grant. Members of the ChinaVine team plan to make a trip to China in May to continue to build partnerships and conduct fieldwork. Find out more at www.chinavine.org.

Interdisciplinary Team Investigates Space, Science, and Spirituality



An international research team of scientists, philosophers and humanities scholars is preparing to study the effects of outer space travel on the inner space of experience.

Led by researchers from UCF's Institute for Simulation & Training (IST), Department of Philosophy, and College of Medicine, the study

will attempt to answer the question, "Why do astronauts and other space travelers consistently describe their experiences as aesthetic, spiritual or religious?" This will be the first scientific study of these experiences as it attempts to link philosophy and the humanities with cognitive and neural sciences.

The John Templeton Foundation will fund the two-year, \$300K effort. Principal Investigators include: Shaun Gallagher and Stephen Fiore (Philosophy/IST), Bruce Janz (Philosophy), Stephanie Lackey, Lauren Reinerman and Eileen Smith (IST), and Garrett Riggs (College of Medicine, Neurology).
