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
Mission

FPEP is funded through outside grants (58%), private donations (32%), and university support (1%),





COST OF PRISON EDUCATION

Spending \$1 per prisoner on prison education saves \$4 to \$5 in the future for decreased rates of recidivism.



RECIDIVISM RATES

The U.S. spends \$31,000 to incarcerate someone every year.

Prison education reduces the 54% recidivism rate by 40%.

This year the Florida Prison Education Project:

- Offered 14 classes to 320 women and men at 6 prisons
- Issued 147 Continuing Education Certificates
- Received \$160,000 in outside grant funding
- Hosted 2 visiting artists and scholars virtually and in person
- Hosted a track at the Faculty Center for Teaching and Learning Summer Conference
- Directed 3 student internships
- Received and donated thousands of books to 8 prisons
- Awarded two \$1,000 scholarships to UCF students impacted by incarceration
- Hosted an art exhibition at UCF Celebrates the Arts
