A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

The School of Visual Arts and Design (SVAD) at UCF has had a dynamic year of creative innovation, academic excellence and community engagement. From national rankings to impactful outreach, SVAD continues to lead in visual arts and design education.

SVAD's presence at UCF Celebrates the Arts was a resounding success, featuring exhibitions in painting, 3D design, animation, architecture and more. Public favorites included the Architecture Showcase, Creative Clash and Character Animation Premieres. The school also hosted its third annual *Art Knight!* drawing over 1,400 attendees and debuting *Atmos: Fall 2024 BFA Exhibition*. Additionally, renowned artists Elizabeth Allen-Cannon, Wendy White and Noelle Mason headlined the Distinguished Artist Series. Additional talks featured leaders in ceramics, animation and design, showcasing SVAD's global reach and interdisciplinary focus.

Major awards and grants were secured by faculty including Dr. Keri Watson (\$800K+ total in grants), Professor Matt Dombrowski (NSF, GDC speaker, Luminary Award), and Dr. Stella Sung (Pabst Steinmetz Award). Nine faculty and staff were honored on Founders' Day, with four earning promotions and tenure.

SVAD students achieved excellence across disciplines. Notable awards include the 2025 Founders' Award (Architecture), Distinguished Undergraduate Researcher Award (Art History) and multiple wins at the AAF Orlando and AIGA SPOT Showcase. MFA students exhibited across Central Florida, while undergrads presented research at UCF's Scholar Symposium.

National recognition for SVAD programs included two top five rankings for our programs in animation and visual effects and a #6 ranking for public colleges for our illustration program (Animation Career Review).

SVAD expanded its partnerships and outreach through Adobe MAX, Limbitless Solutions, TEAAS Symposium, UCF SIGGRAPH and CREATE events. These efforts strengthened SVAD's local and national impact. The UCF Art Gallery hosted eight exhibitions, drawing over 8,200 guests across fall and spring shows, reinforcing the gallery's


role as a central hub for UCF's artistic community.

Her artistic merit has been recognized with awards, including the 2024 Florida Prize in Contemporary Art People's Choice Award, the 2024 University of Central Florida Outstanding Graduate Creative Research, and the 2023 Éclat Law Prize, among others. Njeri has exhibited her work in various shows and galleries, including the 2024 Florida Prize at the Orlando Museum of Art, and solo exhibitions regionally, nationally and internationally. Njeri's work explores themes of self-reflection and the suppression of women perpetuated by cultural norms.

She is a former co-director and resident of Front/Space, a 2013 Rauschenberg Seed Grant recipient, as well as a former co-director at Fjord Gallery in Philadelphia. She has been an artist in residence in numerous locations, such as the Byrdcliffe Arts Colony, Officina Stamperia del Notaio in Sicily, ACRE and Monson Arts among others. She has shown in galleries in the state, as well as nationally and internationally.

UNDERGRADUATE HIGHLIGHTS

Francesca La Madrid won a Student Scholar Symposium award during UCF Research Week

SVAD art history student Francesca La Madrid was awarded a \$300 scholarship at the Student Scholar Symposium, held during UCF Research Week, under the mentorship of Dr. Ilenia Colón Mendoza. The annual symposium provided students with the opportunity to present their research and creative scholarship in poster format. In her project titled "Disability in Baroque: Representation and Perception in Art", Madrid discussed artwork from various artists to explore how depictions of disability convey realism and human vulnerability.



Six students won awards at the Orlando American Advertising Awards

The American Advertising Awards is one of the industry's most prestigious competitions, drawing approximately 35,000 professional and student entries each year. On February 25, AAF-Orlando hosted its annual ADDY® Awards, where six SVAD students were recognized for their incredible work. Among them, three earned a Gold ADDY – the highest level of creative excellence. These students are Nicolas Polania '25 - Gold ADDY; Best of Student Award; Olivia Schneider '26 - Gold ADDY and Silver ADDY; Joshua Alonso '25 - Gold ADDY and Silver ADDY; and Hal Smith '25 - Silver ADDY.



Percy Brashear won a Distinguished Undergraduate Researcher Award

In March, Percy Brashear was recognized at the annual UCF Excellence Awards during UCF Research week, where they received the Distinguished Undergraduate Researcher Award under the mentorship of Dr. Ilenia Colón Mendoza. This honor celebrates exceptional students and faculty mentors who work diligently throughout the year on their research. Brashear was the only undergraduate recipient of UCF's College of Arts and Humanities, making this accomplishment particularly notable.



19 students participated in the American Institute of Graphic Arts (AIGA) Orlando mentorship program, with five receiving awards at the Mentorship SPOT Showcase

The AIGA Orlando Mentorship Program pairs passionate UCF graphic design students with leading industry professionals to prepare them for successful careers. This year, 19 students were matched with mentors from notable organizations such as NASA, PepsiCo and Disney Consumer Products to develop design solutions to rebuild trust in a specific institution. Five students earned awards at the Mentorship SPOT Showcase, where mentees hosted tables to present their work and engage with the community.

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
Architecture student Chase Scholze wins 2025 Undergraduate College Founders' Award




FACULTY HIGHLIGHTS



Njeri Kinuthia presents solo exhibition *Je, Niko Huru?*Threads of Freedom

In the spring, Njeri Kinuthia '19, '24 MFA debuted her solo exhibition *Je, Niko Huru? Threads of Freedom* at the Albin Polasek Museum and Sculpture Gardens. Through self-portraiture, Njeri explores her coming-of-age experiences in Kenya and challenges the relationship between cultural traditions and personal freedom. In addition to her exhibition, Njeri hosted an opening reception, was featured in the museum's annual *Polasek Nights* event, and participated in a panel artist talk alongside fellow Central Florida artists.

Bobby Aiosa hosts solo exhibition *Eternal Landscape* at Art Center Sarasota

In March, assistant professor of sculpture Bobby Aiosa '05, '14, '15 MFA showcased his 11th solo exhibition, *Eternal Landscape*, at Art Center Sarasota. The show explores society's relationship with the built environment, offering a reflection on how we shape, and are shaped by, our surroundings.

Keri Watson earns two grants for Florida Coalition for Higher Education in Prison (FCHEP)

Keri Watson, executive director of Florida Coalition for Higher Education in Prison, leads efforts to expand access to high-quality higher education opportunities for incarcerated individuals across the state. This year, the program was awarded a \$50,000 grant from The Laughing Gull Foundation board of directors, and a \$750,000 grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

Matt Dombrowski exhibits work at Games Developers Conference in San Francisco

The Games Developers Conference (GDC) is the annual premier gathering for creators of cutting-edge innovative games offering inspiring talks, valuable networking opportunities and showcasing the latest technological achievements. Representing Limbitless Solutions, Matt Dombrowski joined Peter Smith '02, '05 MS, '13 PhD and three Limbitless scholars to present their work on the EMG temporalis controller. This piece of technology, built for the training game Limbitless Journey, empowers power wheelchair users to improve independent control of their devices.

The evening also marked the opening reception for Atmos: Fall 2024 BFA Exhibition in the UCF Art Gallery. Guests also savored food and drinks from local Orlando businesses, while enjoying live music by Knights of the Turntables and a special appearance by Knightro himself.

In the 2024-2025 academic year, the UCF Art Gallery remained a vibrant cultural hub for contemporary art, fostering intellectual and creative inquiry among students, faculty and the broader Central Florida community. Through its eight dynamic exhibitions, the gallery attracted over 8,000 visitors, offering a dynamic space for inspiration, conversation and engagement.

In Fall 2024, the *Pathways 2024: The Carlos Malamud Prize Exhibition* featured six artists working in a variety of media, themes, scales and approaches. The exhibition was presented at both the UCF Art Gallery and the Rollins Museum of Art. This collaborative partnership between the two institutions offered artists the opportunity to present their creative work at both venues, as well as be juried by an external panel of three professionals from different areas of the art world.

Teneé Hart was selected as the winning artist, receiving a \$10,000 cash prize, a solo exhibition at the UCF Art Gallery in 2025, and the opportunity to serve as a juror for the following edition of the Pathways exhibition.

With Pathways, Central Florida will be home to a startling new project that may finally help, along with other universities, put to rest the old lone-wolf, starving-artist trope and mentor artists into the networked, financially savvy and fast-moving 21st century.

In October, the gallery hosted Memento Morididdle by Charles Clary, an immersive exhibition that transformed the space with Rococo salon-style walls, densely packed with hundreds of frames, each containing a low-relief paper sculpture. Clary's work subverted the traditional associations of domestic picture frames typically representing joyful, nostalgic memories, like cherished family portraits. Instead, his installation displayed layers of trauma, grief and raw truth. Through this visual presentation, Clary invited the audience to acknowledge collective pain and loss, and to embrace them as badges of honor and growth. The gallery held an exhibition reception and artist talk with Clary, giving students insight into his innovative techniques and artistic practice. He also joined SVAD's mixed media class for a handson cut paper workshop and met with M.F.A studio art and design students during their studio visit.

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The UCF Art Gallery continued the fall semester with the annual SVAD Faculty Exhibition, which presented a dynamic exhibition of artworks by the faculty of UCF's School of Visual Arts and Design. This year, 24 nationally and internationally recognized faculty members shared their creative work and research in the gallery: Chuck Abraham, Bobby Aiosa, Jason Burrell, Owen Buffington, Larry Cooper, Lindsay Deifik, Brooks Dierdorff, Lorna Ruth Galloway, Kevin Haran, Nicholas Kalemba, Njeri Kinuthia, Shannon Rae Lindsey, Theresa Lucey, Justin Nolan, Carla Poindexter, Roberts Rivers, Philip Ringler, Ericka Sobrack, Steven Spencer, Debi Starr, Michael Tole, Megan Thomas, Ashley Taylor and Laine Wyatt.



The semester concluded with *Atmos: Fall 2024 BFA Exhibition*, which showcased the work of senior undergraduate students specializing in book arts, ceramics, drawing, animation, illustration, painting, photography, printmaking and sculpture. The opening reception coincided with SVAD's annual *Art Knight!* event, drawing over 1,400 guests - double the attendees from the first iteration of the event two years prior.











To kick off the spring semester, the gallery welcomed Kristen Letts Kovak and Grace Mikell Ramsey for a two-person exhibition titled *Out* of Order | Let Down. This exhibition explored the visual language of abstraction, naturalism and fantasy. Through visual storytelling, the two artists reflected and represented ongoing issues of female bodies, gender roles, societal expectations and biases. Kristen Letts Kovak attended the gallery's opening reception and delivered a public artist talk, in addition to meeting with MFA Studio Art and Design students during studio visits.

In March, the gallery presented Haunt: 2025 MFA Exhibition, which showcased the thesis work of MFA Studio Art & Design candidates at the UCF School of Visual Arts and Design: Stella Arbeláez Tascón, Brittani Brown and Janessa Douds. In addition, the gallery hosted each candidate's thesis defense, providing faculty, students and community members an opportunity to engage directly with the artists and explore the concepts behind their research.

Next, the gallery launched the first of two BFA exhibitions with Mercurial: Spring 2025 BFA I Exhibition. This showcased the work of senior undergraduate students specializing in book arts, ceramics, drawing, illustration, painting, photography, printmaking and sculpture.

The UCF Art Gallery closed the 2024-2025 academic year with *Kaleidoscope: Spring 2025 BFA II Exhibition*, highlighting the work of Animation & Visualization senior undergraduates. The opening reception welcomed over 400 attendees for an evening of community engagement and celebration.







13th Annual Art History Symposium takes place in UCF Art Gallery

The 13th annual Art History Symposium offered students a platform to share their historical research from upper-level art history courses with the public. This year's presenters included Francesca la Madrid, Sara Pagán Vela and Maximilian Young, each showcasing unique insights and perspectives.

Architecture Symposium Celebrates Senior Undergraduates

Architecture students closed out the academic year with their annual Architecture Symposium an evening celebration showcasing innovative student work. Friends and family gathered to explore standout projects, honor scholarship recipients, and pick up the latest edition of Nexus magazine, highlighting exceptional achievements in student architecture.

BFA and MFA Animation Students Premiere Original Animated Short Films

The UCF Art Gallery continued its \$15,000 annual collaboration with Mattamy Homes to showcase SVAD student artwork at the Meridian Parks Art Walk, a vibrant Lake Nona community of over 4,000 families. Participating students receive compensation for their work and gain valuable professional experience. The gallery also sustained its \$10,000 annual partnership with Cushman & Wakefield, featuring 35 SVAD faculty works annually across five of the company's corporate office lobbies.

The SVAD Distinguished Artist Series is a dynamic initiative designed to introduce students and community members to professional artists in various fields of study. SVAD invites contemporary artists from around the world to speak with students



Boss Laser and SVAD continue collaboration with new tech and renovations

In response to the school's growing need for advanced creative tools, the company has donated cutting-edge equipment and supported renovations to SVAD's Boss Laser Experience Design Lab at the Orlando Tech Center. This support into the 2024-25 academic year reflects a shared commitment to providing students with industry-standard tools that enhance productivity, design skills and project quality.

SVAD and Wendover Housing Partners finalizes \$25,000 collaboration

SVAD has finalized a \$25,000 partnership with Wendover Housing Partners through its Catch Light Public Art initiative. As part of the agreement, SVAD was awarded a contract to contribute to Catch Light Crossings an affordable housing community being developed on Universal Orlando Resort property. The project was introduced to students through SVAD's Advanced Design Lab (AdLab) courses, resulting in the commissioning of two students to create original public artworks for the new community.
