Course Description

This advanced introduction surveys both canonical and contemporary scholarship in fan studies. PR: Graduate standing.

Course Objectives

In this course, students will:

- Gain an understanding of key areas of inquiry in fan studies.
- Become familiar with canonical and contemporary scholarship in fan studies.
- Learn to position their own work in relation to scholars engaging similar areas.
- Produce original research engaging the field of fan studies.
- Gain practice in scholarly practices of feedback and revision

Assignments

100 points 10x Weekly Questions In 10 weeks of their choice, students will submit 3 discussion questions via Webcourses. This is due 3 hours before class time to allow me to review and collate them. 25 points **Research Topic January 22** In no more than 1 double-spaced page, tell me: What object or area of inquiry are you interested in pursuing for this course and why? 25 points **Research Question** February 5 In approximately 1 double-spaced page, tell me: What do you want to know about your topic and why? February 19 **250 points Fantasy Conference Panel** Students will choose a conference relevant to their field and put together a mock (or real) submission, writing their own abstract as well as the panel rationale. 100 points **Final Paper Proposal/Background Reading** March 19 Submit a proposal (5-7 pages): What do you want to know? What is already known? How are you going to find out? How will you complete the work? To what venue will you submit it when you are done and why is that a good fit? 50 points **Final Paper Outline** April 2 In 1-2 pages, provide a working outline. What is your argument (answer to your research question)? What are the subpoints you intend to use to support your argument? What is the evidence you intend to use to support your subpoints? 50 points **Final Paper Draft** April 16 Produce a complete draft of your article (ballpark 8,000 words including references, unless your journal has another requirement) for peer review. **100 points Peer Review** April 23 You will receive the papers of two other students to conduct double-blind peer review. You'll tell your colleague what about their paper works, what doesn't work, and what you suggest to remedy whatever weaknesses it may have. You will be graded based upon the quality of your contribution to your classmate. April 23 50 points **Conference Presentation** On the last scheduled day of class, we will have a mini-conference and invite colleagues to attend. You'll be organized into panels, speak, and field questions. 250 points **Final Paper** April 30 Based on the feedback of the peer reviewers and on the presentation, submit a revised version of the paper. Your final submission will include a practice letter to the editor of the journal to which you intend to submit, explaining what revisions you have made and why you feel they make the paper stronger.
