Writer's Statement for "A Genre Analysis of Patient Notes and Documentation Practices in the ICU"

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When I first walked into my ENC 1102 class at the beginning of the fall semester, I was unsure what I should expect. My professor, Melissa Pompos Mansfield, began explaining the basic concepts we would learn and use throughout the semester. She explained that we would be analyzing genres using activity and genre systems. We were told to brainstorm different writing-based activities that we could potentially investigate and questions we had about those activities. At first, I struggled with finding a community or area of inquiry because many of my classmates were studying their sports or sororities and I was not involved in those groups, but one day I noticed my mother emptying her pockets after a day of work.
