Alissa Warren's article, "Tuesday Night Is HamBingo Night: A Glimpse of the Drag Queen Culture," was published in Stylus 2.1 in Spring 2011 and earned 2nd Runner-Up for the 2011 John C. Hitt Prize for Excellence in First-Year Writing. She also served as assistant editor for Issues 2.2, 3.1, 3.2, and 4.1.

Even now, I find that I enjoy writing most in a professional or anonymous capacity; however, I am proud of having been published in *Stylus* and grateful to have been given the tools and experience to share that learning with my own students.
